 - Approved Resolution 18-806, a resolution pursuant to the authority granted by Section 6-54-11 of the Tennessee Code Annotated, and in accordance with the internal control and compliance manual for Tennessee Municipalities authorizing appropriations for financial donation in the amount of \$20,000.00 to the Goodlettsville Area Chamber of Commerce, a non-profit organization whose services benefit the general welfare of residents of Goodlettsville.
 - Approved Resolution 18-807, a resolution approving an application for a grant with KaBOOM! For the purchase, technical design and support in constructing a playground.
 - Approved Resolution 18-808, a resolution proclaiming Saturday, June 30, 2018 as Pastor Paul Gardner Day in the City of Goodlettsville, Tennessee.

Chief Goodwin's Monthly Report

June 2018

Commander Cherry attended the Cobble Stone Creek block party. Chief Goodwin and Sgt. Deloach attended the latest graduation June 7th at Walter's State Law Enforcement Academy where Commander Cherry was the commencement speaker. Commander Cherry was the first female to serve as their commencement speaker. Several members of the department participated in Touch-A-Truck at Moss-Wright Park on June 8th. June 12th Sgt. Deloach provided Active Killer training to tenants at Rivergate Mall. Chief Goodwin attended the Beer Board meeting on June 13th. Chief Goodwin attended the Drug Task Force meeting June 21st. Commander Cherry gave a safety talk to children attending the Summer Camp at Madison Creek Elementary on June 22nd. Chief Goodwin attended the Chamber of Commerce Luncheon on June 28th. On June 15th Commander Cherry and Sgt. Deloach picked up bears and blankets collected by Simmons Bank. On June 28th officers from the department visited daycares at Connell Methodist and Metro Baptist and distributed some of the bears recently collected.

The Pharmaceutical Bin provided by the State of Tennessee Department of Environment & Conservation was in the lobby during the month of June and 56.4 pounds of unwanted pharmaceuticals were deposited. Since its use 1672.32 pounds of unwanted pharmaceuticals have been deposited.

In review of the TIBRS data comparing June 2018 to June 2017 Crime Against Person decreased from 25 to 16 incidents a 36.00% decrease, and Crime Against Property decreased from 81 to 63 a 22.23% decrease and overall we had decrease from 98 to 79 incidents. Our UCR total for the month was an 10.26% decrease from 78 to 70 incidents.

Our proactive efforts were good for the month of June. Our officers made 683 Traffic Stops and 21 Terry Stops. They made 112 Traffic Arrests and 11 DUI Arrests. From these Traffic Stops resulted 16 Felony charges, 147 Misdemeanor charges, and 16 warrants were served. They had 38 drug confiscations (19 from

traffic stops). They issued 15 Misdemeanor Citations, made 51 Physical Arrests with 51 Misdemeanor charges and 19 Felony charges. They made 7 Juvenile Misdemeanor Arrests and issued 1 Juvenile Citations.

The other part of the strategy involves serving outstanding warrants. Persons with outstanding warrants have already proven a proclivity for involvement in criminal activity. By arresting them for their outstanding warrants we prevent their opportunities for committing crime. During the month they made 2 Warrant Service Attempts. They served 11 Felony Warrants and 35 Misdemeanor Warrants.

Our officers continue to check our apartments, neighborhoods, businesses and parks. They conducted 188 apartment checks, 304 checks of neighborhoods, 805 business checks and 250 park checks. They had 152 Community Contacts. They issued 332 Park Smarts and found 1 open door.

JUNE REPORT

This monthly forum will keep you informed of ongoing and upcoming projects and provide updated information on where we are with projects as they progress from the planning phase into design and become reality. Here is a sampling of what we currently are working on to enhance our town's livability.

Peay Park Splash Pad

This six hundred thousand dollar project is 50 percent grant and will extend over the next two years. It will add a water feature at the location of the old baseball field in Peay Park. This will be the first phase in the revitalization of the City's oldest park. **Status: Approval to bid the site preparation and building renovations has been granted and the city is awaiting delivery of the equipment. Construction is expected to begin in summer of 2018 with the expected opening of the project in the spring of 2019.**

Main Street Enhancements

This 12 million dollar project is 80 percent grant and will extend over the next two and one half years. Its purpose is to change the look and feel of the heart of Goodlettsville. The aim of this project is to make the center section of town a more walkable and inviting place to shop and mingle. **Status: Title searches are complete and appraisals for easements have begun. Utility relocation design coordination is underway. A public input meeting on the project was held in January with comments taken for design consideration. Construction is expected to be complete in the spring of 2020.**

Sidewalks Additions

In conjunction with the Main Street project the city is preparing a series of projects to enhance walkability throughout Goodlettsville. Budgets are being set to add sidewalks along certain sections of the main thoroughfares in the city such as Loretta Drive, Caldwell Drive, Rivergate Parkway, North Creek Circle and Windsor Green Boulevard. These projects will seek to link residential areas with commercial and recreational areas and provide connectivity for some of the disconnected commercial developments within the city. **Status: The TDOT Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant for a sidewalk connecting Moss Wright Park to North Creek Park along Caldwell Road and Long Hollow Pike has been resubmitted for funding. The decision on this grant funding is due in summer 2018. A new grant application for a sidewalk on Loretta Drive has been submitted. Budgeting and preliminary design are ongoing on other projects as well. ADA accessibility deficiencies have been identified and a corrective action plan is being prepared.**

Conference Drive Improvements

The Conference Drive corridor is the southern entrance to our city. The need for this road to look and feel inviting is imperative to bringing visitors and businesses into Goodlettsville. The preliminary design documents of this half million dollar, 80 percent grant project are complete and are awaiting the start of phase two of the signalization upgrades to finish. **Status: Final design of the project is complete and has been submitted to TDOT for approval. Right of way approval has been granted. Utility coordination is awaiting approval. Construction is expected to begin in fall of 2018 with completion by the fall of 2019.**

Sanitary Sewer Interceptor Improvements

These improvements funded by the city will eliminate the need for two costly pump stations in the Madison Creek drainage basin. These projects will reduce maintenance and energy costs for the City's sewer collection department. **Status: The Madison Creek sewer bypass has begun construction with completion scheduled for the fall of 2018.**

Signalization Upgrades

Phase One of the signal coordination is complete and got things started to help traffic move smoother on Long Hollow Pike and Conference Drive. Phase two will provide upgrades to coordinate and improve traffic flow on Conference Drive, Long Hollow Pike and Main Street. This 2 million dollar, 100 percent grant will provide state of the art signal control for the City. **Status: Right of Way has been approved and we are awaiting TDOT approval for bid. Equipment procurement proposals have been received and await TDOT approval. Construction is expected to begin in the fall of 2018 with completion by the fall of 2019.**

Drainage Improvements

With the implementation of the storm water utility in 2013, the city is now able to address some of the drainage system problems that currently exist in Goodlettsville. Area drainage issues are being identified and earmarked for projects as funds become available. These projects such as the Gateway neighborhood and Hollywood Street will improve flow to better distribute runoff in heavy rainfall for the purpose of flood prevention. **Status: Design on the second phase of the Gateway Neighborhood drainage improvements is pending design. A feasibility study for storm water detention in the area of Old Two Mile Pike and negotiations for drainage easements are in process. Two other culvert replacement projects on Bluebird Drive and Wren Road are also currently in the design phase. Construction for the replacement culverts is scheduled for completion by the end of 2018.**

Bank Stabilization Moss Wright Park

The bank along Mansker Creek at Moss Wright Park is being eroded by changes in stream flow. A grant study is underway for long term remediation. **Status: A new phase of bank stabilization has been applied for and will be announced for funding soon.**

Mansker Creek Greenway

The addition of a 2 million dollar, 50 percent grant funded half mile of trails has been laid out to connect the Windsor Green Neighborhood and Conference Drive with Moss Wright and North Creek Parks. The route will follow the banks of Mansker Creek providing a trail system to enhance Goodlettsville's already extensive outdoor walking experience. **Status: Preliminary design is complete and the project is currently in the land acquisition phase. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2019 with construction completion by the summer of 2020.**

The presentation gave insight and understanding into the need for Landscape and Stormwater requirements for improvements in water quality and the physical appearance of the community. The training fulfilled one hour of the four hours required annually for boards and commissions based T.C.A. requirements by the State of Tennessee.

There were additional discussions by the Planning Commission that included a proposed annexation and rezoning for a 5.44-acre parcel at 257 Allen Road. The proposed rezoning would be from the existing Sumner County RA (Residential A) zoning district to a compatible City of Goodlettsville zoning district of R-40.

Another discussion item was for revisiting the current format for Planning Commission minutes. Planning Staff and the City Attorney will continue working on creating a more condensed, yet effective, format going forward.
